Most churches have decided to close public worship services and turn toward other means of connecting with people. We live in unprecedented days. Keep in mind; these are the types of days that birthed Christianity. The Romans occupied Israel. The religious leaders knew a significant number of facts about God but did not have a personal relationship with God. Jesus had recently been killed on a cross, and later He arose from the grave and ascended to sit at the right hand of the Father.

It was in the midst of this tumultuous time that Christianity suffered one of its most significant losses. Stephen was a deacon in the early Church. The Bible tells us Stephen was a man filled with the Holy Spirit and well respected among both Christians and the community at large. Unfortunately, the Jews determined the best way to end the movement Jesus had begun was by killing the leaders, and Stephen was first. After a mock trial and an unusual defense of his faith, Stephen was stoned. His last words were words of mercy for those who were killing him.

When the Jews killed Jesus, believers began leaving Jerusalem and taking the Good News of Jesus Christ with them. Every continent has seen evidence of the power of God through the lives of Christians. It all started with the killing of Stephen.
